Summer Programming provides new experiences, opportunities

As a new school year approaches, there are many exciting opportunities for students to take part in at Boquet Valley. However, these opportunities don't only happen during the school year. Over the summer, students who signed up for OASIS Summer Programming were able to continue expanding their skill sets. Over the course of six weeks, students were able to try new hobbies, meet friends and make memories.



"When students come here for

programs, they can have positive experiences in a new environment while socializing with other students," OASIS Grant Coordinator Marcail Miller said. "A lot of the activities students did this summer were STEM-related, and they went on field trips to places like the mountain coaster or Craig Gardens. They had a variety of experiences while being here this summer."

There was a lot of communication and coordination by Miller to have more than 20 programs this summer. She started reaching out to teachers in December 2022 to get a better understanding of the activities they wanted to lead. In January 2023, sign up forms went out.

This was Miller's first year overseeing the OASIS Grant. She said in the past the summer programming



had less than 20 students sign up, but this year there were roughly 80 students attending programs.

Each week hosted different programs for students to do, including crafts, soccer camp, archery, music and dance. Students in "Let's Get Crafty" had weekly themes of crafts to hone their artistic skills. One week was ocean themed. Pompom-shelled turtles and paper clip squid were the highlights for the students.

"Lego Stop Motion" explored the creativity and patience behind stop-motion videos. Students made movies with Legos, and at the end of the week, they had popcorn and juice while watching each other's work.

"Universal Ukulele" taught students how to play the ukulele in one week. They learned different chords and songs, and the week evolved to include two student drummers. At the end of the week, they performed for fellow students and family members. Some songs included, "We Will Rock You," "A Sky Full of Stars," and "Don't Worry Be Happy."

In "Capturing Moments," students worked on their photography skills. They learned how to take pictures with various cameras, what to capture in those photos, the differences between the types of photography such as portraits, action and landscape, how to edit photos and how settings,

like aperture and shutter, effect the moments they wanted to capture.

Soccer Camp was really popular amongst students. Students honed basic skills, learned new ones and amped up their game. They were dedicated to working hard and made significant improvements in just one week.

Another fun and collaborative week was for



students to attend Morse Academy Irish Dance camp for a week. Griffins were bused to the camp in West Chazy, where



they were able to learn how to Irish Dance, make crafts, cross train and go swimming in Lake Champlain. On a hot day, campers walked next door to Happy Pike to cool down with some delicious ice cream.

"This summer was successful, but there are always areas to improve and grow," Miller said. "The teachers are amazing about finding solutions to the things that aren't working great, and they are always giving me feedback and trying to make the program better for the students."

Secretary Gwen Goff also shares in this excitement for seeing the students come back.

"I missed seeing the kids over the summer," echoed Goff. "They are so excited and eager to learn, and they truly make your day seeing them walking up and down the halls."

According to LVC Secretary Janelle Pulsifer, there have been several rooms changes for teachers and counselors to home, which will make a more natural flow for students. Counselors and School Support Services are also located in a new, centralized location for easy accessibility.

"Whether kids are having a great day or a rough day, I want my room to be a calm and comfortable place for them," LVC Counselor Shannon Baumann said. "I have brought in many intentional tools to help kids with different strategies to help them."

Baumann, new to BVCS staff, said her biggest



preparation for the new school year was getting her room comfortable. She painted the walls a calming blue, brought in plants and comfortable seating. There will be a small fish tank with a waterfall, so students can listen to the sounds of running water.

Boquet Valley is excited to welcome back former and new students, faculty and staff.

The 2023-24 School Year will be another opportunity for students to learn, make memories and accomplish goals with the support of BVCS staff.
